It is a great pleasure for me to pen a few lines on "BEAM" with a nostalgic feeling.

After formation of our Alumni Association in the year 1973 (first batch passed out in 1966), we started discussions about getting various information of our alumni, alma mater, their achievements, future plans etc. (Remember, we did not have the all-powerful IT, then). In the year 1975, in the offices of Bubu (P. K. Chakravarty, 67/C) some of us decided to bring out a News Bulletin from Kolkata, Head Quarters of our Association. It was named "BEAM".

Initially, it was decided to bring out BEAM quarterly with an editorial on contemporary issue (Editor: P. K. Bhattacharjee, 66/C), news of Alumni members, college, family news, future plans of the Association, news of new or local chapters formed or to be formed. And, it was also decided that BEAM shall be distributed 'FREE' through postal services (remember courier services was not popular then). Each issue used to be of eight pages and around four hundred copies were printed.

Local chapters were encouraged to send news/views regularly to Kolkata and our endeavour was to form more and more local chapters. By this time, we had formed the Durgapur chapter, Bokaro chapter and Asansol chapter was under formation.

I still remember how eagerly I used to phone Pradeep Bhattacharjee and enquire - what about next issue?, are you getting response from more members?,.....and so on. BEAM was sailing smoothly. We were feeling slightly comfortable against our identity crises, being graduates from a very new college from North Bengal!!

As usual, like all other organizations, may be after seven or eight years, our Alumni Association could not continue publication of BEAM. It was a very sad episode. Then, if I remember correctly, it was Pankaj Mitra (68C), who again took initiative to revive BEAM, but this good initiative lasted for a short period.

I believe it is a very difficult task to bring out a News Bulletin regularly for the Alumni Association but it is NOT IMPOSSIBLE - and I was proved right when I received a phone call from Subrata Bhowmik (67/M), our President that BEAM is again reappearing very soon. Actually, I was overjoyed!!

I have a small suggestion that a separate fund of selffinancing nature to be formed along with some dedicated Alumni for this venture. A part of publication cost plus postal charges may be recovered from Alumni. A good network amongst Alumni needs to be formed for getting all up-to-date news. At this old age, we are all really looking for rays of BEAM!!

My final wishes for BEAM is that of a long life this time around without any break.....

A Day to Remember



E - breaking

College, Jadavpur Engg. College & Techno India.)

Do you remember the days of 1974s, when we had 20" Black & White TV with limited hours of program and that too in few houses. Factually it was a community show. The house, having a TV set was a place for assip cum entertainment show, even though the degree of quality was not appreciable. Having two TV sets in a house, which is very common in present day scenario, was unimaginable. Analogous is the situation for Computers. Now, many houses have one P.C. and a Laptop. It is also a fact that the with fast track growth in Electronic arena, the quality of output is upgrading. In Computer Sector, new technology comes every Six months while in case of TV it is little slow. But in reality, in the total market, the availability of TV ranges from Quality of picture (e.g. B & W to Color), Size (4" to more than 100"), Technology (e.g. CRT to LCD), etc. Similar is the case for Computers - it has also undergone havoc changes in Size (from Main frame to Palm Top), Speed (From Bytes to Few Giga Bytes), Appearance (e.g. Robust to friendly), Stationary to Pocket size, Use (only Data output to Multimedia), etc. The third item is the Cell Phone. Now, having 3 to 4 Cell phone in a house of middle class family is common. This is also changing its geometry to Specification in a very fast track. Do you remember the size of a cell phone of 1994 and the facilities it used to cater? Now, have a look at the "i phone" and astonish yourself.

Having such availability, in plenty and in various categories, persons get allured for a product, which he is not having. Such 'not having' meant both up-gradations of existing product as well as having a new product. The present day market strategy of "Pay by installments" or "Bring Old Product and go back with a Latest product" has made "having a Latest Product" easier. Now, Exchange of the TV sets and Cell Phones are very common. Computers are being regularly upgraded to avail better benefits. Have you ever thought where these old items go? This is about our indigenous as well as New imported products. On top of these similar products are being imported from Developed countries, which is obsolete in their country but having smaller residual and operable life in Developing and Under-developing countries. These will be converted to rejects in short spell of time. Such huge items, or let us call it junks, are the Electronic Wastes. What is to be done with these? Can you imagine, what was the contribution of Kolkata City, in 2007, on such e-Waste? It is about 9,000 Tons. It is not only in Kolkata City but every where. Kolkata is behind Bangaluru, Chennai, Delhi and Mumbai. In the year 2005, e-waste of India was 1,46,180 Tons. It is expected that by 2012 such figure will be over 8,00,000 Tons.

What is being done with such huge waste? These for broken into pieces to extract Metals like Cadmium, Lead, Mercury, Steel etc. In the process dangerous items like Battery, Capacitor are also broken, which discharges unhealthy Chemicals. This is called e-breaking. Such e-breaking process also discharges gases like Sulphur Dioxide, Hydrochloric Acid, Carbon Mono oxide, etc. This breaking work is undertaken by the units under unorganized sector, where words like Pollution, Contamination are unheard (or unbothered). Such problem will further aggravate if the concept of Business Process Outsourcing is adopted in this market. In USA such e-Breaking of one P.C. costs \$20, while in India it is only \$2.

As such, People have to be careful and supportive towards Governmental action to prevent such spreading of Pollution and contamination due e-Waste.

So, next time you upgrade your Computer or avail exchange offer, consider yourself as a contributor to Environmental Pollution. Don't feel yourself guilty! - give your endeavor to save the world from pollution in totality. Let us have a clean world and make life Jhingalala!!!
